

Salvia argentea (AGM)	£4.50	Superb feature plant with large basal rosettes of intensely white, woolly leaves. Large, branching, candelabra-like stems with WHITE flowers held in grey calyces; summer. Well drained sheltered position in full sun. 90x60cm.
Salvia 'Belhaven'	£4.50	Woody based sub-shrub with aromatic, mat-green deeply veined leaves. Short spikes of soft-red flowers from purple bracts over a long period through summer to the frosts. Needs a very warm,sheltered, well drained spot in full sun. (6-10) 90cm.
Salvia broussonetii	£4.80	Only found on two cliffs in Lanzarote & Tenerife, this showy sage forms evergreen rosettes of thick, soft green, velvet textured leaves. Well branched spikes with large, high hooded white flowers from late summer into autumn. Only hardy in the most sheltered spot or cold greenhouse.(7-9) 60cm.
Salvia bulleyana	£4.20	Spikes of hooded YELLOW flowers with a distinct maroon lip; June & July. A handsome perennial with corase, hairy leaves. Well drained soil in sun. 60x60cms.
Salvia bulleyana 'Blue Lips'	£4.50	Distinct form of this very hardy species from yunnan with rosettes of deeply veined, dark green leaves. Branched stems with spikes of narrow tubular, soft custard-yellow flowers with s striking blueberry lower lip during summer. Well drained soil in sun or part shade. (6-9) 50cm.
Salvia cacaliifolia (AGM)	£4.80	Although not reliably hardy it is best overwintered in a cold greenhouse. Erect with slightly hairy leaves & arching spikes have bright gentian blue hooded flowers throughout summer into autumn. Ordinary well drained soil in sun. 75x60cm.
Salvia clinopodioides	£4.60	Previously sold as 'Michoacan Blue'. Now identified, this unusual tuberous Mexican species emerges late, with hairy rounded leaves on fleshy stems. Stumpy, whorled heads of intense gentian blue flowers from burgundy bracts during late summer & autumn. proving surprisingly tough in a sheltered spot. (7-9) 60cm.
Salvia concolor	£4.80	(True Form) Hardyish species from Argentine, often confused with guaranitica. Very woody stems with pointed, light yellowish-green leaves. Huge spikes of good sized, bright-blue flowers, held on black stems during August to October. Seems hardy in the South in a sheltered spot. (8-11) 3,0x1.5mtrs.
Salvia confertiflora	£4.80	Rather tender species from Brazil, needing at least cold greenhouse treatment. Large, densely haired leaves topped by narrow spikes of dark furry blood orange to red bracts from which reddish-orange flowers protrude;- late summer & autumn. Very sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (7-9) 100cm.
Salvia corrugata	£4.50	A recently introduced species with attractive corrugated', dark green leaves. Tall sprays of rich blue, hooded flowers in autumn. Requires winter protection. Well drained soil in sun.
Salvia desoleana	£4.80	Highly aromatic Sage, endemic to Sardinia with triangular, very hairy, grey leaves. Spikes of very large, lavender-blue flowers with a white lower lip, rimmed brown, from leafy green bracts from mid to late summer. Seems hardy in a sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (6-9) 75cm.
Salvia elegans	£4.20	(syn.S.Rutilans) Needs winter protection. Large hairy leaves smell of pineapple when rubbed.Spikes of rich red hooded flowers. 60x60cm. Oct-Nov. Sheltered, well drained spot in sun
Salvia forreri	£4.20	Gently running, front of the border species with erect spikes of widely spaced, bright blue flowers, each with a small white throat;- summer to the frosts. Seems totally hardy in a sheltered, well drained spot. (6-10) 30cm.

Salvia forsskaolii white-flowered	£4.80	An unusual white form of this very hardy species from the Balkans & Turkey. Basal rosettes of hairy, lyre shaped leaves. Long, well branched spikes of large white flowers, held in green bracts during midsummer. Best in retentive, well drained soil in sun. (6-8) 80cm.
Salvia glutinosa	£4.15	A coarse, hairy-leaved plant with spires of unusual hooded PALE YELLOW flowers; May to July. Good clump former. Sun lover for well drained soil. 90x90cms.
Salvia greggii 'Heatwave Blast'	£4.55	(Heat wave Series) Compact form bred in Australia. Woody stems with good sized, grey-green, aromatic leaves. Spikes of salmon-pink flowers with a prominent lower lip, from June to the frosts. Hardy in a sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (6-10) 65cm.
Salvia greggii 'Heatwave Sparkle'	£4.55	(Heatwave Series) Shorter form, bred in Australia. Woody stems with grey-green, aromatic leaves. Spikes of bright cerise-pink flowers with a prominent lower lip & white throat from June to the frosts. has a more compact habit. Sheltered, well drained spot in
Salvia greggii 'Icing Sugar'	£4.50	Woody stemmed small shrub with aromatic, small, deeply veined leaves. Spikes of bright candy pink flowers with the two bottom lips a startling white. Flowers from midsummer to the frosts. Reasonably hardy in a warm, sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (6-
Salvia guaranitica 'Black And Blue'	£5.80	This Argentinian species has very showy rich blue flowers with a prominent lower lip, held in black-smokey calyces throughout summer. Large, nettle-like fresh-green leaves. Only hardy in a very sheltered spot in well drained soil in sun. (6-10) 120cm.
Salvia hians	£4.80	Erect well scented Sage carrying spikes of rich purplish-blue flowers with a prominent white lower lip; early to late summer. Large, rather rounded hairy leaves. Often misrepresented in cultivation. Fully hardy. Well drained soil in full sun. 60x60cm.
Salvia hierosolymitana	£4.50	A strange, odourless species from the Eastern Med & Middle East. Rosettes of oval, light green very hairy leaves. Widely spaced whorls of tubular wine-purple flowers with a prominent white lower lip from midsummer into autumn. Seems surprisingly hardy in a sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (6-10) 60cm.
Salvia involucrata 'Bethellii'	£4.80	Introduced in 1881 from Mexico, this more compact form has bright cerise-pink flowers from slightly redder bracts, with a puckered, closed mouth. Flowers commences in early autumn until stopped by frosts. Sheltered, free draining spot in sun. (8-10) 140cm.
Salvia x jamensis 'Golden Girl'	£4.80	Bred in California, this spreading sub-shrub has narrow, glossy, aromatic dark green leaves. Spikes of creamy-yellow flowers with a faint peach blush on the tube, from June to the frosts. Needs a warm, sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (6-10) 60cm.
Salvia x jamensis 'Hot Lips'	£4.50	Woody stemmed perennial with spikes of elegant white flowers stained rich red around the mouth & along the tube. In cold they can be all white, in heat all red. Flowers;- June to the frosts. Hardy in a warm, sheltered spot in full sun. (6-10) 60cm.
Salvia x jamensis 'Peter Vidgeon'	£6.75	Woody based semi-evergreen with spikes of soft lilac-pink flowers, stained white at the centre, from midsummer to the frosts. They emerge from black flushed buds. Small, aromatic leaves. Best in a very sheltered, free draining spot in sun. (6-10) 75x60cm.
Salvia x jamensis 'Raspberry Royale' (AGM)	£4.20	A small, shrubby, slightly tender plant with tiny leaves. A myriad of bright-raspberry hooded flowers all summer. Well drained soil in sun. 60x60cm. Flowers: June-July

Salvia koyamae	£4.80	Low, creeping woodlander from Honshu in Japan. Spreading stems with hairy leaves. Erect spikes of narrowly tubular, lemon-yellow flowers during late summer, through autumn. Best in a sheltered, woodland soil in part shade. (7-10) 60cm.
Salvia 'Madeline'	£4.50	Very long flowering form of our native sage with long, widely spaced spikes of deepest inky-blue flowers with a white marked lower lip, often repeating. Flowers May to August. Retentive, well drained soil in sun. (5-8) 45cm.
Salvia meyeri CDPR3071	£4.95	New species introduced from Argentina. Informal bush with heart-shaped, nettle like leaves. Whorled spikes of two lipped sky-blue flowers with a white marked lip, flowering most freely in autumn. Proving surprisingly hardy in a sheltered spot in sun. (8-11)
Salvia napifolia	£5.75	2.00 Unusual Turkish species with soft lilac-blue flowers held in purple bracts on hairy stems; late summer. Basal clumps of large, white, hairy leaves. Growable outside in well drained soil in a sunny sheltered site. 45x45cm.
Salvia 'Nel'	£4.80	Obtained as a microphylla, which obviously isn't, it looks very much like a true greggii type. Woody based small sub-shrub with small, glossy, aromatic leaves. Open spikes of intense violet-blue flowers with a white throat, from black bracts, from midsummer to the frosts. Hardy in a sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (6-10) 60cm.
Salvia nemorosa 'Amethyst' (AGM)	£4.20	Neat, upright branching plants, with spikes of small, lilac-pink hooded flowers held in wine-purple bracts. Rough textured, crinkled leaves. Well drained soil in sun or part shade. (6-8) 60cm.
Salvia nemorosa 'Caradonna'	£4.50	Long spikes of rich, purple-blue flowers from dark calyces in early summer. Basal clumps of pale-green, wrinkled leaves. Fully hardy in well drained soil in sun or light shade. (5-8) 50cm.
Salvia nemorosa 'Lubecca' (AGM)	£4.20	Upright spikes of VIOLET-PURPLE, hooded & lipped flowers; June to September. Clumps of rich green foliage. Any well drained soil in sun or part shade. 60x45cms.
Salvia nemorosa 'Marcus'	£4.20	Very dwarf, compact form, with short spikes of deep-purple blue, larger flowers on purple flushed stems. Mats of coarse, wrinkled, dark green leaves. Good in pots. Well drained soil in sun. (6-7)
Salvia nemorosa 'Ostfriesland' (AGM)	£4.20	Erect spikes of hooded, DEEP VIOLET-BLUE flowers held in crimson purple bracts; June to September. Popular front of border perennial forming carpets of deep green, crinkled leaves. Fertile, reasonably drained soil in sun. 45x45cms.
Salvia nemorosa 'Pink Friesland'	£4.50	The counterpart to 'Ostfriesland' with narrow spikes of tubular pinkish-red flowers from persistent maroon bracts;- late spring & summer. Basal rosettes of coarse leaves. Likes a well drained soil in sunny site. (5-7) 45cm.
Salvia nemorosa 'Schwellenburg'	£4.50	Basal rosettes of crinkled leaves & long spikes of purple-rose flowers from pink flushed calyces all summer, held in fat pyramidal heads, a little later than most nemorosas. Well drained soil in sun. (6-10) 50cm.
Salvia nemorosa 'Sensation Deep Blue' (Sensation Series)	£4.50	(Sensation series) Dwarf form with fat spikes of rich, deep blue tubular flowers from May to July. Mats of deeply veined aromatic leaves. Can re-bloom if cutback after flowering. Best in a well drained soil in sun or light shade. (5-7) 30cm.
Salvia nemorosa 'Steel Blue' (Bordeau Series)	£4.20	A distinct colour break with narrow, erect, branched spikes of small, tubular steely metallic-blue flowers during late spring & early summer. Basal clumps of deeply veined, coarse leaves. can repeat if cut back. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (6-8)
Salvia nipponica	£4.50	Unusual Sage from Taiwan & Japan with aromatic, unusual, three lobed, almost arrow shaped leaves, deeply veined & dark green. Terminal whorled heads of golden-yellow flowers, usually in autumn & early winter. Needs a sheltered spot in part shade, never too dry. (8-10) 35cm.

Salvia nubicola	£4.35		Native to much of Asia, this tough species has coarse, arrow shaped leaves smelling of goat. Spikes of soft yellow flowers with a purple speckled throat;- late summer into autumn. Any reasonable soil in sun or part shade. (7-9) 90cm.
salvia patens 'Oceana Blue'	£4.50		Striking, medium sized form of patens, a Mexican species which is hardy in a sheltered spot where it overwinters as a tuber. Hairy, heart-shaped leaves are topped by spikes of spikes of very large, gentian blue flowers with a prominent, gaping lower lip. Flowers throughout summer. Light, free draining soil in sun. (6-10) 75cm.
Salvia pratensis 'Lapis Lazuli'	£4.45		Not quite sure the raiser of this plant got it right ! Long spikes of narrow blush-pink, widely spaced flowers from maroon calyces. Rosettes of coarse leaves. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (5-7) 60cm. VERY SLOW & DIFFICULT TO
Salvia pratensis 'Twilight Serenade' (Ballet Series)	£4.20		Selected form of our native sage with widely spaced spikes of hooded, intense violet-blue flowers from smokey-black bracts;- early summer. Rosettes of wrinkled basal leaves. Well drained soil in sun or part shade. (5-7) 60cm.
Salvia procurrens	£4.50		Very unusual trailing sage from Brazil & Uruguay, proving surprisingly tough. Very long, trailing stems, with rounded, toothed glossy green leaves. short spikes of small rich blue flowers from the leaf axils intermittently through summer. Very effective in a hanging basket! Light, free draining soil in sun. (6-8) 20x75cm.
Salvia roemeriana (AGM)	£4.20		Rarely seen species in cultivation, this has well branched spikes of narrowly tubular, dark-red flowers in profusion throughout summer. The basal leaves are aromatic & distinctly scallop-shaped & held on red stalks. Poor, dry, sheltered spot in sun.60cm
Salvia sagittata	£4.80		Unusual woody based species from high in the Andes. Large, arrow shaped yellow-green, aromatic leaves. Pyramidal spikes of of narrowly tubular, intense gentian-blue flowers from July to the frosts. Hardy to -5c or protect in a cold greenhouse in winter. (7-11) 100cm.
Salvia scabra	£4.50		This species, endemic to the Cape of Good Hope is hardy in mild winters. Small, bushy shrubby species with small, deeply veined leaves, looking rather scrunched up. Open, one sided spikes of usually soft blue-flowers, but ours all seem to be white from seed. Light, free draining soil in a sunny, sheltered spot. (5-10) 40cm.
Salvia sclarea turkestanica of hort.	£5.80	2.00	Branched stems clothed in large pink, white & blue bracts holding the large lipped flowers; July-August. Very aromatic. Rosettes of grey, hairy leaves. A very showy but short lived perennial. Hot dry position in full sun. 90x45cms.
Salvia sclarea 'Vatican White'	£4.20		Bold, imposing biennial with tall spikes of almost white flowers with the faintest pink flush. Large white bracts with a faint blue flush. The hairy leaves are aromatic. Free draining soil in sun. (7-9) 150cm.
Salvia serboana	£9.75		syn. S.vitifolia. From the mountain forests of Oaxaca, Mexico, this close relation of S. patens has much bigger, softly hairy, triangular foliage and strong growth to 1.8m in one season. Large intense deep blue flowers in late summer. Seems reasonable hardy in a sheltered spot. (7-10) 150cm.
Salvia 'Silke's Dream'	£4.50		darcyi x microphylla. Unusual, slightly sprawling hybrid almost continuously covered in long spikes of larger, two-lipped, orange flushed soft red flowers. Grey-green, aromatic leaves. Will need a very warm, sheltered spot in full sun. (5-9) 120cm.

Salvia somalensis	£4.50		Very unusual shrubby Salvia from high highlands of Somalia. Important in cosmetic production with has long, narrow, light green, highly fragrant leaves. whorls of soft blue hooded flowers, with a white throat from midsummer to the frosts. Hardy in mild winters so take cuttings as a precaution. (6-10) 130cm.
Salvia sp. CC6306	£5.95		Unidentified Himalayan Sage. collected by Chris Chadwell in the Himalayas. Rather arrow like leaves are slightly hairy. Subtly bicoloured dusky-purple & yellow flowers in spaced spikes during late summer & autumn. Hardy & easy. Needs a name. Any reasonable soil in sun. (7-9) 60cm.
Salvia x superba 'Lyon Rose'	£4.50		Bushy perennial with crinkled, deep grey-green leaves. Striking almost black stems studded in widely spaced, small, tubular, dusky soft-pink flowers during June & July. Good edger for a retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (6-7) 40cm.
Salvia x superba 'Merleau'	£5.55	2.00	Compact, uniform variety with narrow, upright spikes of rich violet-blue flowers, initially emerging white, produced continuously from dark smokey black bracts. Deeply veined dark green leaves. well drained soil in sun or part shade. (5-8) 30cm.
Salvia x superba 'Merleau Rose'	£4.20		Compact, bushy perennial with well branched stems carrying densely packed spikes of old, dusky-rose flowers over a long period from late spring, through summer. Ideal for pots or borders. Light, well drained soil in sun. 35x40cm.
Salvia x sylvestris 'Dear Anja'	£4.50		Widely spaced spikes of violet-blue flowers with a white marked lower lip, emerging from inky black bracts during early to midsummer. Basal rosettes of deeply veined,. scallop shaped aromatic leaves. Well drained soil in sun or part shade. (5-8) 60cm.
Salvia x sylvestris 'Mainacht' (AGM)	£4.50		Spikes of large, hooded DARKEST INDIGO-VIOLET flowers from purple bracts; May & June. A lovely perennial for producing a deep colour in early summer. Well drained sunny position. 60cms.
Salvia x sylvestris 'Negrito'	£4.50		Hardy hybrid, with long spikes of narrow, tubular, midblue flowers, held in smokey black calyces, throughout summer. Basal rosettes of coarse, crinkled, dark green leaves. Well drained soil in sun or light shade. (5-8) 60cm.
Salvia x sylvestris 'Rugen'	£4.50		New, German, dwarf strain with spikes of MID BLUE, hooded flowers; June & July. Rosettes on oblong, wavy edged, mid green leaves. Well drained, sunny position. 20cms.
Salvia x sylvestris 'Schneehugel'	£4.20		Dense heads of tubular, lipped, white flowers with green calyces on branched, upright stems; early to mid summer. Clump-former with long, scalloped, mid-green leaves. Light, humus-rich, moderately drained soil in sun or part shade. 80x30cms.
Salvia x sylvestris 'Tanzerin' (AGM)	£4.50		From a clump of dark green foliage arise erect spires of DEEP VIOLET hooded flowers over a long period; June-August. Loved by bees. Well drained soil in sun. 80x60cms.
Salvia x sylvestris 'Viola Klose'	£4.50		(pratensis x nemerosa) Very showy new European hybrid with slender spikes of narrow, tubular, VIOLET-BLUE flowers held in deep violet calyces; June to September the calyces persisting longer. Reasonably drained soil in sun or part shade. 60x45cm.
Salvia uliginosa (AGM)	£4.50		A graceful tall perennial with waving sprays of azure-blue flowers on branching stems; August & September. Saw-edged leaves. Needs a moist soil in a sunny position & a warm, sheltered spot. From Argentina. 150x60cms.
Salvia 'African Sky'	£4.80		Tall, back of the border Salvia for late season colour. Airy spikes of narrowly tubular, sky-blue flowers, lighter than straight uliginosa, which is one of it's parents. Flowers from late September through Autumn. Needs a sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (8-10)
Salvia uliginosa 'Ballon Azul'	£5.20		Bred by Ewald Hugin in Germany, this short form offers spikes of clear, sky-blue flowers from August to November. Erect, willowy stems with small, toothed, glossy green leaves. Needs a warm, sheltered, well drained spot in a retentive soil. (7-11) 100cm.

Salvia verticillata	£4.20	Stately species with long arching spikes of small INTENSE VIOLET-BLUE hooded flowers from reddish-purple calyces. Flowers freely in late summer. Healthy green scented leaves. Well drained fertile soil in sun. 75x60cm.
Salvia verticillata 'Alba'	£3.95	Showy, bushy, stately perennial with large basal ash-grey leaves. Arching stems with small, hooded, white flowers held in purple calyces. Bracts remain showy even after flowering. Well drained soil in sun. 75x60cm. Flowers: late summer.
Salvia verticillata 'Smouldering Torches'	£4.50	Selected by Coen Jansen, this is more upright with persistent rich purple bracts & stems from which violet-blue flowers protrude in early summer. Cut back hard after flowering for a repeat in autumn. Even the larger leaves have a purple suffusion. (5-7)45cm.
Salvia 'Violin Music'	£4.50	One of those free flowering sages that are perennial in warm, sunny gardens. Woody stems with deeply veined, aromatic leaves. Spikes of soft violet-lavender flowers from black bracts from June to the frosts. Sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (6-10) 60cm.
Salvia virgata	£4.60	(syn.S.regeliana) Branching stems carry hooded, PALE LILAC flowers; July to August. A tall, upright perennial with broad basal leaves. Well drained soil in a sunny position. 90x60cm.
Salvia 'Waverly'	£4.80	Tall, leucanthera hybrid with erect stems having coarse, mid green leaves. Widely spaced whorls of narrowly tubular, palest pink flowers, held in smokey calyces; summer & autumn. Only hardy in the most sheltered, well drained spots in sun. (6-10) 90cm.
Salvia 'Wendy's Wish'	£4.80	buchananii x chiapensis. Tall, slightly tender Salvia from Australia. Reddish stems & persistent bracts carry large, tubular rich cerise-pink flowers from midsummer to the frosts. Needs a warm, sheltered spot in a sun & hope for mild winters. (6-10) 120cm.
Sambucus ebulus	£5.20	Herbaceous Elder from Central Europe to SW Asia. Spreading, unbranched stems with foetid smelling, pinnate leaves. Domed heads of white flowers, often pink tinged during June & July followed by small, glossy black fruit. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (6-7) 150cm.
Sanguisorba dodecandra	£5.50	Attractive species with mounds of pinnate, grey-green leaves with rounded, oval toothed leaflets. Arching, fat greenish-white bottlebrushes on red flushed stems during mid to late summer. Retentive soil in sun or part shade. (6-8) 100cm.
Sanguinaria canadensis	£4.50	A slow, creeping rhizome with red sap. Leaves folded vertically slowly unfurl. Flowering stems carry pure white tulips'. Cool site in shade. 20x30cm. Flowers: April-May.
Sanguinaria canadensis multiplex 'Plena' (AGM)	£5.00	Sumptuous spring flowering woodlander with generous, bowl-shaped, double waterlily like pristine white flowers, emerging with the folded, lobed grey leaves in spring. Dormant by summer. Root has an orange sap. Rich woodland soil in part shade. 93-4) 10cm.
Sanguisorba albiflora	£4.50	(syn S.magnifica alba/S.obtusa albiflora) A lovely dwarf form of this underused group. Forms mounds of finely divided, greyish leaves. Wiry stems topped with curling, white bottlebrushes. For a moisture retentive soil in sun. 75x60cm. Flowers: July-August.
Sanguisorba armena	£4.85	very good foliage form, reintroduced recently by Bill Baker. the pinnate, silver grey leaves are quite large & dramatic. Narrow white bottlebrushes on well branched stems during late summer & autumn. Retentive or moist soil in sun/pt.sh. (7-9) 120cm.
Sanguisorba 'Autumn Bliss'	£5.20	This is a very tall, strong growing form, up to 2mtrs if the soil is rich & is well fed. Clumps of toothed, broadly pinnate leaves, often red blotched. Heavily branched stems with erectly held rich burgundy red flowers during later summer & autumn. very adaptable to most soils in sun or shade. (7-9) 200cm.
Sanguisorba 'Blackthorn'	£5.20	officinalis x ?. Unusual hybrid with long, thin, erect spikes of soft dusky silver-pink flowers, held in small clusters;- late summer & autumn. Mounds of pinnate, large, toothed pale green leaves. Best in a good or retentive soil in sun or part shade. (7-9) 90cm.

Sanguisorba canadensis	£4.35		Bold clump former with long arching spikes of white bottlebrush-like flowers on tall stems. Large, toothed pinnate leaves. Retentive or moist soil in sun or part shade. (6-7) 150cm.
Sanguisorba 'Cangshan Cranberry'	£5.50		Collected by Dan Hinkley in Cangshan, China, this huge form has stumpy, fat spikes of rich cranberry-purple flowers, held on well branched stems during midsummer into autumn. Strong stems with large, glaucous, pinnate leaves. Best in a retentive or moist soil in sun or part shade. (6-9) 200cm.
Sanguisorba 'John Coke'	£5.50		Much like a shorter form of 'Korean Snow'. This is principally a tenuifolia hybrid with airy stems carrying very narrow, long, swan neck like white flowers during August & September. Basal clumps of very finely cut, fresh green leaves. Retentive soil in sun or part shade. (8-9) 90cm.
