Tanacetum coccineum 'Garden Treasure'	£6.45	3.00	Shorter form of pyrethrum with good sized, vibrant cerise-pink flowers with a an anemone centre composed of a yellow centre, surrounded by a white ring. Flowers over a long period through summer. Mounds of finely cut, aromatic leaves. needs a sharply drained soil in full sun. (6-8) 45cm.
Tanacetum coccineum 'H.M.Pike'	£6.25	2.00	Large upward facing bright red single daisies with a golden eye in early summer. Basal clumps of ferny foliage. Good for cutting. Divide regularly for vigour. Well drained soil in sun or part shade. 75x45cm.
Tanacetum coccineum 'Laureen'	£4.50		Rather nice, short form of this cottage garden favourite. Simple. starry salmon-pink daisies, almost white around the eye, held on unbranched stems during mid to late summer. Basal clumps of finely cut, fresh leaves. Needs superb drainage in a sunny spot. (7-
Tanacetum coccineum Robinson's Pink flowered	£4.50		Waving upright stems topped by rich deep pink upward facing daisies with a yellow eye. Old cottage garden favourite forming clumps of fresh-green, ferny foliage. Well drained soil in sun. Good for cutting. 60x45cm. (Early summer)
Tanacetum corymbosum	£5.80	2.00	From the grasslands of Southern Europe, this attractive daisy like plant has good sized heads of starry white daisies almost continuously throughout summer. Basal mounds of finely cut, grey tinged leaves. Creates a nice, hazy froth in a light, free draining soil in sun. (6-9) 100cm.
Tanacetum macrophyllum	£4.15		Tall, aromatic, back of border perennial with deeply cut, pinnate grey-green leaves. Flattened heads of Achillea like grey flushed white flowers;- midsummer into autumn. A South European native for any reasonable soil in sun or part shade. (7-10) 120cm.
Tanacetum niveum 'Jackpot'	£4.20		Highly aromatic perennial with finely cut intensely silver leaves. The whole plant is smothered in YELLOW-EYED WHITE DAISIES in midsummer. Much loved by bees. Well drained soil in full sun. 75x45cm.
Tanacetum poteriifolium	£4.50		Medium sized, slow growing upright perennial from Turkey with basal mounds of very finely cut bright silver leaves. Well branched stems covered in clouds of small yellow eyed white daisies over a long period throughout summer. Rather dry, poor soil in sun. (6-8)
Tanacetum vulgare crispum	£4.20		Spectacular foliage plnts forming mounds of very finely cut, slightly twisted aromatic leaves. Button like yellow rayless flowers are formed less freely than the species. Well drained soil in sun or part shade. (7-8) 75cm.
Tanacetum vulgare 'Golden Fleece'	£4.15		An improved form of Isla Gold' With the aromatic, finely cut, intensely burnished golden-yellow leaves remain stable all summer. Flattened heads of small gold eyed, white daisies during late summer. Colours best in sun but grows in shade. (6-9) 45cm.
Telekia cordifolia	£4.20		Rather coarse daisy with basal rosettes of large, deeply veined leaves. Branched spikes of deep golden-yellow, upward facing daisies with narrow, ragged ray petals;- late summer. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (7-9) 90cm.
Tellima grandiflora	£4.20		coll;- Coyote Wood, Redmond, Seattle, Washington State, USA. Spreading clumps of matt green, hairy, evergreen leaves. Spikes of yellow-green flowers; April-June. Excellent ground cover for light or full shade. 60cms.

Tellima grandiflora 'Delphine'	£5.20	Unusual variegated form of the West coast American woodlander. Mounds of maple-shaped leaves, heavily & randomly splashed creamy-white, held on very hairy stems. Airy spikes of lightly scented, pink flushed green flowers during summer. Excellent ground cover for a woodland soil in part or full shade. (5-7) 45cm.
Tellima grandiflora 'Forest Frost'	£6.75	Good ground cover even for dry shade. mats of soft green leaves are heavily flushed white, especially so in the winter. Spikes of small soft-pink bells in spring. Any reasonable soil in sun or shade. (4-7) 60cm
Tellima grandiflora 'Purpurteppich'	£5.80	Excellent ground cover for shady places. Spreading clumps of Heuchera-like leaves are washed & veined purple. Narrow spikes of large green flowers tinged pink; all summer. For a retentive soil. 45x60cm.
Teucrium hircanicum 'Purple Tails'	£4.20	Shrubby, sage-like bush with downy, aromatic leaves. Long spikes of densely crowded, narrow, tubular, PURPLE-LILAC flowers; late summer. Sun lover for any fertile, well drained soil. 60x45cm.
Teucrium viscidum 'Lemon And Lime'	£3.85	syn.Scrophularia. Gently running perennial with nettle like soft green leaves splashed gold, especially so in spring. By summer they are sage green. Small, narrow spikes of pale purple tubular flowers in late summer. Humus rich, retentive, well drained soil.(7-
Thalictrum actaeifolium 'Perfume Star'	£5.50	Large, heavy clusters of highly scented lilac-flowers with white tipped filaments, through summer into autumn. Clumps of rounded lobed, glaucous grey leaves. easily grown in a retentive soil in sun or part shade. (6-9) 90cm.
Thalictrum 'Anne'	£3.80	Huge form, like 'Elin' with glaucous flushed leaves. Purple stems carry huge, fluffy heads of white flowers from purple-pink buds;- June & August. Retentive, rich soil in part shade but very adaptable. (6-8) 230cm.
Thalictrum aquilegifolium	£4.20	Long, wiry stems branch into wide, fluffy heads of PURPLE-MAUVE flowers; May to July. Attractive, light green, columbine-like foliage. Any moisture-holding soil in sun or part shade. 90cms.
Thalictrum aquilegifolium 'Thundercloud' (AGM)	£4.80	Massed with clouds of fluffy, deep lilac-purple flowers; early to midsummer. Attractive, luxurious, fern-like, purple-tinged foliage. Prefers a humus-rich, moisture holding soil in dappled shade. 100x45cms.
Thalictrum 'Black Stockings'	£5.20	Selected hybrid from rochebruneum this impressive hybrid has large, well branched heads of lilac pink, fluffy flowers on startling black stems during summer. Large, gently lobed basal leaves. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or shade. Ht to 6ft.
Thalictrum cultratum HWJCM 367	£4.60	Heavily branched stems with clouds of fluffy, small, greenish-white flowers & long thread-like, purple anthers; late summer & early autumn. Pinnate, lobed basal leaves. Humus-rich, moist soil in part shade but tolerates sun. 90x45cm.
Thalictrum delavayi (AGM)	£4.50	(syn.T.dipterocarpum) Probably the most beautiful of the species forming mounds of dainty, lacy foliage. Impressive pyramidal panicles of small LILAC flowers with distinct creamy stamens giving an airy display. Rich, fertile soil in sun or part shade. 150x60cm
Thalictrum delavayi 'Album'	£4.80	Heads of long stalked white fluffy flowers with prominent yellow stamens; midsummer to early autumn, in large pyramidal heads. Mounds of pinnate foliage. Moist, humus rich soil in part shade but tolerates sun. 120x60cm.
Thalictrum delavayi 'Gold Lace'	£4.80	Frothy clouds of small creamy-white flowers during midsummer. Layered grey-green leaves with a creamy-yellow flush. Often develops dark stems. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (6-8) 90cm
Thalictrum delavayi 'Hewitts' Double' (AGM)	£4.80	Huge pyramidal panicles of small, double, LILAC flowers; July to August. Makes a mound of daintily delicate, grey-green foliage. Enriched, moist soil in sun or part shade. 150x60cms.

Thalictrum 'Elin'	£4.80		A big, bold, imposing form, with large mounds of deeply divided, gently lobed basal leaves. Stout stems with huge umbels of lilac flowers during mid to late summer. Back of the bordr in retentive well drained soil in sun or part shade. (7-9) 300cm.
Thalictrum flavum glaucum (AGM)	£4.20		A clump forming perennial with much divided, very glaucous, blue-green leaves. Clusters of fluffy, pale yellow flowers on slender stems; summer. Any well drained soil in sun or part shade. 130x60cm.
Thalictrum ichangense	£4.80		Small, slowly creeping woodlander with unusual, purple brown leaves covered in a heavy silver overlay of veins. Small heads of lilac fluffy flowers in late spring. Best in a woodland soil in part shade. (4-6) 30cm. China - Guizhou, Hubei, Liaoning, Shanxi, Sichuan, Yunnan & Zhejiang. .
Thalictrum isopyroides	£5.80	2.00	A dwarf form from Afghanistan with delicate grey ferny foliage. Clusters of small lilac flowers. Ordinary fertile soil in sun. 45x45cm. Flowers: June-August.
Thalictrum lucidum	£4.60		Tall imposing species. Large feathery plumes of small, buttermilk yellow flowers in billowing clouds; June to September. Lobed, shining green, basal leaves. Retentive yet well drained soil in sun or part shade. 120x60cm.
Thalictrum minus 'Adiantifolium'	£4.50		A delicate' plant plant with foliage like a maidenhair fern. Sprays of tiny yellow flowers with long stamens; May to July. Fertile soil in sun. 30x45cms.

Thalictrum pubescens	£4.80		syn. polygamum. Very long flowering species from eastern USA with mounds of layered, finely divided, grey flushed leaves. Huge, airy plumes of creamy-white flowers over a long period from May to July. Prefers a retentive soil in sun or part shade. (5-7) 100cm.
Thalictrum rugosum	£5.20		There is a lot of dispute over this name, but a handsome plant nonetheless. Tall species with open, fluffy plumes of white flowers on branched stems ;- mid to late summer. Divided, slightly glaucous leaves emerge with a wine flush. Any reasonable soil in sun or shade. (7-9) 150cm.
Thalictrum sp.	£5.20		I have been trying to put a name to this unusual Thalictrum which grows in Blooms garden, they sell it as orientale which is clearly wrong. This forms a frothy mound of very finely cut, small round lobed ash grey glaucous leaves. Heeds of tiny, spidery lilac-pink flowers during early to midsummer. Does not seem to key out to anything in cultivation. (5-7) 40cm.
Thalictrum speciosissimum	£4.50		An invalid name for a species grown at Blooms of Bressingham for years. Looks suspiciously like a form of Thalictrum flavum glaucum to me. Billowing mounds of lacy, glaucous grey leaves. Flattened heeds of lemon yellow flowers through summer. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (7-8) 150cm.
Thalictrum 'Splendide'	£4.50		Tall form with airy clouds of good sized lilac-purple flowers with a tuft of cream stamens;- midsummer. Laced, lobed grey-green leaves. Any reasonable soil in sun or part shade. (7-8) 130cm.
Thalictrum sp. RCB-RA-P-14	£4.50		coll:- Campo Quihano, Salta Province, Argentina. Grown from seed collected in scrubland. No details yet. (7-9) 120cm.
Thalictrum squarrosum	£4.50		Delicate species from China through to Russia. Erect stems with lacy, round lobed, pale, grey tinged leaves. Open heads of large lilac flowers with cream stamens during summer. prefers a light, woody soil in part shade. (6-8) 45cm.
Thalictrum 'Tukker Princess'	£4.80		probably a hybrid of flavum, this exceptionally tall form has huge plumes of rich golden yellow flowers on dark, sturdy stems ;- May to July. Glaucous grey flushed, much lobed leaves. Best in a retentive soil in sun or shade but very adaptable. (5-7) 250cm.

Thalictrum uchiyamae	£6.25	2.00	A dwarfer, compact Japanese species forming mounds of finely lobed, dark-green leaves. Small fluffy heads of palest lilac flowers in early summer. Looks fragile & slow but is reliably hardy. Best in retentive soil in part shade. (6-7) 60cm.
Thermopsis chinensis	£4.80		Rarely seen Chinese form with much divided leaves divided into three narrow segments, like a birds foot. Narrow, erect spikes of pea like, brilliant yellow flowers during late spring. Easily grown if a little slow in retentive, well drained soil in sun. (5-7) 75cm.
Thermopsis divaricarpa	£4.80		Close to montana, this Colorado native makes mounds of tri-lobed, slightly downy green leaves. Condensed spikes of pea-like, golden-yellow flowers from May to July. They are followed by black curving seed pods. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (5-7) 60cm.
Thermopsis lanceolata	£4.15		Forms clumps of erect stems well clothed in attractive 3-palmate, long, elliptic leaves heavily creased along the midrib especially when young. Heads of pea-like yellow flowers. Dislikes root disturbance. Light, well drained soil in sun or light shade.
Thermopsis rhombifolia montana	£4.50		Quick spreading lupin-like plant with shamrock leaves. Spires of GOLDEN-YELLOW flowers; June & July. Any reasonable, well drained soil in sun. 90x90cms.
Tiarella cordifolia (AGM)	£6.75		Forms large, spreading mats of slightly hairy bright green leaves. Slender spires of small, SOFT PINK flowers; April-May. Any reasonable soil in light shade. 30x75cms.
Tiarella 'Dunvegan'	£4.50		Carpets evergreen maple-shaped dark-green leaves with a faint black splash. Spikes of small, starry-white flowers from pink buds on delicate stems are freely produced from early summer to the frosts. Good ground cover for sun or shade. (6-10) 25cm.
Tiarella 'Pacific Crest'	£4.80		Trailing stems with rather large, very deeply cut, round lobed soft green leaves with a huge central burgundy-brown splash. Short spikes of starry white flowers even on the runners, during summer & autumn. easy in any reasonable soil in shade or sun. (5-10)
Tiarella 'Sunset Ridge'	£4.80		Forms mats of low trailing stems with the glossy, maple shaped leaves having a matrix of black central markings. Short spikes of starry white flowers, emerging from pink buds during summer & autumn. ideal trailing out of pots. Easy in any soil in shade or sun.
Tinantia pringlei AIM77	£4.35		Amazing Tradescantia relative from Mexico with purple-brown spotted leaves. Small, three petalled purple flowers nestle in the crown for much of the year. Will need a sheltered, well drained spot in sun. (3-10) 30cm.
Trachystemon orientalis	£4.20		Blue heads of flowers appear on naked stems in February followed quickly by large, hairy, heart-shaped leaves. Adaptable to any conditions. 30cm.x90cm. Flowers: February-April.
Tradescantia 'Angel Eyes' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.20		Good sized pure white flowers, lightly stained pale blue at the centre with a tuft of rich blue filaments. June to August. Fleshy, stem clasping sea green leaves & boat shaped bracts. Moist, fertile soil in sun or part shade. (6-8) 60cm.
Tradescantia 'Innocence' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.20		Umbels of 3-petalled, PURE WHITE flowers on top of fleshy stems; June to September. Leafy clumps of strap-like, fleshy, green leaves. Any reasonable soil in sun or part shade. 60x60cms.
Tradescantia 'Lucky Charm' (Charm Series)	£4.20		Dwarfer form with fleshy, stem clasping rich golden-yellow, keeled grassy leaves. Three petalled rich purple flowers nestle in the crown in early summer, often repeating if cut back. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (5-8) 25cm.
Tradescantia 'Mac's Double' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.20		(x andersoniana group) Clusters of unusual, pompom like lavender-blue flowers like miniature roses from June to September. Fleshy, stem clasping leaves. Prefers a poorer soil in sun. (6-9) 45cm.
Tradescantia 'Mariella' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.20		(andersoniana). Dwarf. Large, three-petalled violet-blue flowers with fluffy yellow anthers. Stem clasping fleshy green leaves on erect stems. Best in a poor soil in sun or part shade. (6-9) 35cm.

Tradescantia 'Regal Charm' (Charm Series)	£4.50		Dwarf form, ideal for pots as it has a long season of interest. mounds of strap like, deeply keeled, burnished gold leaves. Clusters of striking, rich royal-purple, three petalled flowers, nestling in the crown throughout summer. Easy in any reasonable soil in sun or part shade. (5-8) 25cm.
Tradescantia 'Rosi' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.20		(x andersoniana) New Dutch hybrid, with the three petalled flowers pure-white with a pale-pink flush at the eye & slightly deeper filaments. Flowers early summer. Fleshy, stem clasping fresh-green leaves. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or light shade. (6-
Tradescantia 'Rubra' (Andersoniana Group)	£3.95		Clumps of glossy fresh green strap-like leaves with clusters of charming three petalled CLARET-RED FLOWERS from late summer into autumn. Easy & reliable. Sun or part shade in any reasonable soil. 60x60cm.
Tradescantia 'Snowbank' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.50		Shorter form with clusters of upward facing, three petalled white flowers with a small tuft of lilac filaments. Flowers May to September. Fleshy, stem clasping leaves. Troublefree plant for any reasonable soil in sun or part shade. (5-8) 45cm.
Tradescantia 'Sunshine Charm' (Charm Series)	£4.50		Dwarf form with mounds of strap-like, deeply keeled, rich burnished gold leaves, more chartreuse if grown with some shade. Clusters of three petalled soft mauve-pink flowers, nestling in the crown through summer. Easily grown in any reasonable soil in sun or part shade. (6-9) 25cm.
Tradescantia 'Sylvana' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.20		(x andersoniana). New European hybrid with umbels of three-petalled claret-red flowers with furry anthers. Stems clasping fleshy green leaves on erect stems. Best in a poor soil in sun. (6-8) 35cm.
Tradescantia 'Valour' (Andersoniana Group)	£4.20		Clusters of small three petalled rich cerise pink flowers with matching hairy filaments throughout summer. Fleshy stems with narrow, ribbon like grey green leaves. Retentive, well drained soil in sun or part shade. (6-8) 75cm.
Tradescantia virginiana 'Brevicaulis'	£4.20		Showy dwarf species with three-petalled, RICH CERISE-PINK flowers with fluffy filaments; late summer. Arching, lance-shaped very narrow fleshy mid-green leaves. Moist, fertile soil in sun or part shade. 45x45cm.
Trautvetteria carolinensis occidentalis	£4.80		Much like a condensed form of Thalictrum in flower. Creeping root with maple like fresh green leaves. Clustered heads of fluffy white flowers in summer. Rare North American plant for a well drained, leafy soil in part or full shade. (6-8) 30cm.
Tricyrtis 'Empress'	£6.75	2.00	Very large, white flowers, with three long petals & three shorter ones, giving a triangular shape. They are heavily spotted maroon. Fresh green leaves on well branched stems. Retentive, woodland soil in part or full shade. (8-10) 60cm.
Tricyrtis flava	£4.80		Delicate Japanese species with upward facing, orchid like golden yellow flowers, covered in a fine brown speckling;- early autumn. Stem clasping glossy green leaves. Best in a leafy, humus rich, woodland soil in part or full shade. (8-10) 60cm.
Tricyrtis formosana (AGM)	£4.50		flowers: White heavily spotted purple. A very attractive addition to the herbaceous border giving good late season colour. The upright stems carry pairs of glossy dark green leaves heavily mottled brown. 80x45cm. Flowers: Aug-Oct.
Tricyrtis formosana 'Seiryu'	£4.50		Well branched stems carry upward facing, elegantly poised white flowers, covered in fine purple freckles. The tips of the petals are an intense electric blue if the soil is acid, more purple if alkaline. Flowers mid to late autumn. Narrow, glossy spotted leaves on spreading stems. Retentive, woodland soil in part or full shade. (8-
Tricyrtis 'Golden Leopard'	£4.95		Summer flowering hybrid with erect stems having pale-green, slightly hairy leaves. Upwardfacing, orchid like, soft yellow flowers heavily speckled with a fine purple-bronze spotting. Rich, never too dry soil in part or full shade. (6-7) 50cm.
Tricyrtis hirta 'Albomarginata'	£6.75		Erect stems, with the dark-green leaves having a very fine lemon-white margin. Upward facing white flowers with a heavy fine claret speckling. Moist, fertile yet well drained soil in part or full shade. (9-10) 60cm.

Tricyrtis hirta 'Variegata'	£4.50	Neat form with the perfoliate leaves having a regular creamy-white margin. Exotic, upward orchid like white flowers covered in a fine maroon speckling, held in the upper leaf axils during late summer & autumn. Best in a retentive, woodland soil in part or full shade. (8-10) 50cm.
Tricyrtis hirta Washfield form	£4.50	Easy to grow, non running form with delicate, upward facing, orchid like, palest lilac white flowers with distinct, regular dark purple spotting;- late summer & autumn. Lightly spotted leaves. Woodsy, humus rich soil in part shade. (8-10) 100cm.
Tricyrtis ishiana	£4.80	Arching, almost trailing stems with glossy, dark-green leaves. Fleshy, waxy bright-yellow flowers in the leaf axils. Humus rich, moist soil in shade. (8-9) 30cm.
Tricyrtis latifolia	£5.80	(syn. T.bakeri) Branching stems with yellow flowers heavily freckled light brown; late summer & autumn. Tall stems with rich green clasping leaves. Humus rich soil with some shade. 60x60cm.
Tricyrtis 'Moonlight Treasure'	£4.95	ohsumiensis x nana. Dwarf hybrid with two ranks of broad, slightly spotted leaves. Small clusters of upturned elegant yellow flowers with brown speckling;- autumn. Not the easiest to keep needing a retentive but never wet soil in part shade. (8-10) 30cm.
Tricyrtis 'Sinonome'	£4.60	An old, obscure Japanese cultivar with smooth, slightly shiny, unmarked leaves. Exotic orchid like white flowers heavily speckled burgundy, more so at the tips which look blotched ;- late summer & autumn. Best in a woodland soil with some shade. (8-10) 75cm.
Trifolium ochroleucon	£4.50	Closely related to the Hungarian clover, this elegant species has spikes of pea-like Creamy-white flowers in succession all summer. Trifoliate leaves are covered in a dense silky white hair. Any well drained soil in sun or light shade. (6-9) 60cm.
Trifolium repens 'Green Ice'	£3.95	Spreading mats of clover-like pale green leaves with a silvery central zone. Umbels of small pea-like white flowers in rounded umbels; early to midsummer. Moist yet well drained soil in full sun. 15x75cm.
Trifolium repens 'William'	£4.20	Very vigorous form with tri-lobed smokey bronze-red leaves with the centre an olive green. Small heads of usual buff-white flowerheads during summer. Good tumbling out of pots. Retentive, well drained soil in sun. (6-8) 20cm.
Trifolium rubens 'Red Feathers'	£4.50	One of the best plants to attract insects, this has spikes of rich cherry red flowers on branched red flushed stems intermittently throughout summer. trifoliate leaves. Best in a well drained soil in a sunny spot. (6-8) 50cm.
Trillium catesbyi	£4.80	coll;-S.Carolina. Desirable & difficult species with glossy, wavy edged leaves held in threes. The recurved PINK flowers are held on long stems & hang amongst the leaves. Hates chalk. Moist, rich, well drained soil in part or full shade. 15x30cm.
Trillium erectum (AGM)	£10.95	Handsome plant with upward facing leaves in threes the single, MAROON flowers in the crown have paler anthers; April & May. Dies back quickly after flowering. Slow to multiply. Moist, cool, woodland soil in part or full shade. 40x30cm.
Trillium erectum x flexipes	£6.20	Seed raised plants giving a wide variety of colours, often rich burgundy red but also white & pinks can occur, all are good. Whorls of three leaves are often well blotched & mottled burgundy. Cool, moist, woodland soil in part shade. (4-5) 30cm.
Trillium erectum Harvington dark-flowered	£13.70	Slow growing, woodland ground cover from N.E. USA. Rosettes of unmarked green leaves in a whorl. Nodding, three petalled rich plummy purple-flowers on a long stalk ;- April to May. Best in a rich, woodland soil in part or full shade. (4-5) 20cm.
Trillium flexipes 'Harvington Selection'	£12.55	Strong growing form of this easy Trillium with outward facing white flowers showing the sage green bracts between the petals. Unusual pink ovaries. Flowers ;- April & May. Plain or lightly mottled leaves. Retentive, well drained rich soil in part shade. (4-

Trillium grandiflorum roseum	£16.55	Seed raised plants from best selected plants, built up from several generations. They offer very large, shell-pink, three petalled flowers, held between pairs of three lobed leaves during spring. Very slow to multiply. Best in a cool, moist, woodland soil in part or full shade. Trillium 'Harvington Dusky Pink'	£13.70	flexipes x sulcatum. Result of a controlled cross, this is a very vigorous form which has taken 15 years of breeding. A whorl of fresh green leaves with an elegant, clear dusky-pink flower, nestling in the crown ; - April & May. Slow to multiply, needing a rich, woodland soil in part or full shade. (4-5) 45cm.
Trillium kurabayashii	£14.80	Much mystery surrounds this plant. From N.W USA this may be confused with chloropetalum or anything else come to that. Maroon-red flowers nestle in a whorl of three fresh-green leaves. Leafy, woodland soil in part shade.
Trillium luteum (AGM)	£12.55	3-petalled, pale-primrose, upturned flowers within a nest' of 3 marbled-green leaves - a harbinger of spring! Cool, moist, woodland conditions. 30x30cm. Flowers: March-April
Trillium pusillum	£4.80	Small, dainty species with delicate, three petalled, soft pinkish-white flowers which nestle in the crown of a whorl of three, narrow, linear, dull-green leaves. Not the easiest to establish in moist, well drained, rich soil in part or deep shade. (4-5) 10cm.
Trillium simile	£5.80	Rare species from S.E USA with sweetly scented, outward facing white flowers, with a dark eye & the green bracts showing between the petals;- late spring. A whorl of apple green leaves. Retentive, humus rich soil in pt/shade. (4-5) 40cm.
Trillium sulcatum	£12.55	Robust form, with boat-shaped, deep ruby-red flowers, with a silky sheen texture. Whorls of fresh green leaves. Leafy, woodland type conditions in part or full shade. (4-5) 20cm.
Trillium vaseyi	£14.80	Robust, eventually vigorous species from Southeast USA. Whorls of broad, rhombic leaves, with nodding, dark-red maroon flowers with overlapping petals in early summer. Dormant by late summer. Humus rich, woodland soil in part shade & shelter. (5-6) 50cm.
Triosteum himalayanum	£4.80	Sprawling erect stems with large bristly leaves which almost clasp the stem. Small honeysuckle like spikes of purplish red flowers in whorls followed by showy red berries. Best in light leafy soil with some shade. 45x45cm.
Triosteum pinnatifidum	£4.80	handsome herbaceous honeysuckle with perfoliate large hairy leaves, deeply lobed & cut. Insignificant flowers in early summer followed by white fruit with a rosy pink flush. many medicinal uses. Retentive soil in part or full shade. (5-6) 90cm.
Tristagma nivale	£4.85	Strange little South American bulb with strap like leaves. Small, curious brown flowers over a long period in late spring mimic an orchid. Too few yet to try outside but seems hardy & may be OK on a well drained rockery. Sunny, sheltered spot. (4-5) 10cm.
Triteleia 'Corrina'	£4.15	Bulbous perennial with heads of trumpet-shaped deep purple-blue flowers with white central veining on the petals. The narrow grassy leaves wither at flowering time. Well drained soil in sun or light shade. (5-7) 20cm.
Triteleia 'Double Touch'	£4.50	Fine, bulbous perennial with open heads of starry rich violet-blue flowers, with anemone like, scrunched up centres, during May & June. The grassy leaves have often withered at flowering. Best in a light, free draining soil in sun. (5-6) 45cm.

Tritonia crocata 'Tangerine'	£3.95	Small cormous perennials with flared, trumpet-shaped tangerine-orange flowers held on wiry stems over fans of narrow sword-like leaves. Needs an excellently well drained soil in full sun. Protect in cold areas. (5-7) 15
Tritonia lineata	£4.20	relatively new to cultivation, this produces unusual biscuit-cream flowers before the leaves in spring. Narrow fans of upright leaves. Seems hardy in a sheltered, well drained spot in the South at least. (2-5) 30cm.
Tritonia lineata 'Parvifolia'	£4.20	Cormous perennial closely related to Crocosmia. Slender spikes of funnel-shaped, soft cream flowers, flushed apricot on the tube; - autumn. Grassy, erect, linear leaves. Surprisingly hardy in a well drained, sheltered spot in sun. (8-9) 30cm.
Trollius altaicus	£5.80	Comes from the Altai, right across to China. Found in moist meadows, this forms mounds of finely cut, fresh green leaves. Bowl-shaped, almost incurving golden-orange flowers from May to July. Striking red stigmas. Retentive, even wet soil in sun or part shade.
Trollius x cultorum 'Alabaster'	£8.00	A most desirable plant slow to propagate. Beautiful incurved globe shaped double pale cream buttercups during midsummer. Basal clumps of fresh divided leaves. Any not too dry soil in sun or part shade. 60x30cm.
Trollius x cultorum 'Goldquelle' (AGM)	£4.50	Unusual hybrid with large, single flat yellow buttercups over a long period in late spring & early summer. Basal mounds of finely cut, fresh green leaves. Retentive or moist soil in sun or part shade. (5-7) 90cm.
Trollius x cultorum 'New Moon'	£4.80	Rather similar to 'Alabaster' but has much more vigour. Bowl-shaped, semi-double palest creamy-white flowers held clear of the basal mounds of fresh, finely cut leaves; - may to July. Best in a retentive soil in sun or light shade. (5-7) 50cm.
Trollius europeus	£4.50	Fleshy stems topped with large, incurving, cool-lemon blooms; April-May. Finely cut, fresh green leaves. Deep, moist soil which does not dry out in sun or part shade. 60cms.
Trollius europaeus 'Lemon Supreme'	£5.20	Rather dwarf form, not often seen in cultivation. Well branched stems carry incurving, globe shaped rich lemon yellow flowers on branched stems during late spring & early summer. Basal clumps of very finely cut, fresh green leaves. Retentive, even moist soil in sun or part shade. (5-6) 35cm.
Trollius macropetalus	£6.80	Russian species, closely allied to chinensis. Unusual cup-shaped flame orange flowers with a tuft of long filaments at the centre which fill the bowl. Flowers June & July. Basal rosettes of divided, glossy green leaves. Seems very slow. Retentive or moist soil in sun or part shade. Rare. (5-7) 60cm
Trollius pumilus	£4.50	Smaller Chinese Alpine species forming tight mats of deeply cut, dark green leaves. Bowl shaped golden yellow flowers in late spring. Retentive or moist soil in sun or part shade. (4-6) 20cm.
Trollius pumilus 'Double Jeopardy'	£5.20	Selected here from wild Chinese collected seed, this has sprays of small, semi-double, bowl-shaped rich golden flowers with shiny petals, held on well branched stems during mid to late spring. Basal mounds of much cut, glossy, divided leaves. Retentive, even moist soil in sun or part shade. (4-5) 25cm.
Trollius sp. SDR 4816	£4.50	Collected by David & Stella Rankin in China, this shade loving species is reminiscent of a tall form of pumilus. Mounds of finely cut basal leaves. Short stems with glossy golden yellow single buttercups in late spring. Retentive or moist soil in part shade.
Trollius stenopetalus	£6.25	(syn. T. papavereus) Large almost waxy single golden yellow upward facing flowers on long stems; June to August. Deeply divided clumps of basal leaves. Moist yet well drained soil in sun or part shade. 45x45cm.

Trollius vaginatus	£4.95	Small species from mountain meadows. Basal rosettes of very finely divided cut & glossy bright green leaves. Bowl shaped yellow flowers through spring on short stems, elongating later when in seed. Retentive or moist soil in sun. (4-7) 15cm.
Trollius yunnanensis orange flowered	£4.15	Rarely seen species from Sichuan & Yunnan with simple, single, waxy, RICH ORANGE flowers, almost reflexing with age;- summer. Basal leaves are lobed & glossy. Retentive or moist soil in sun or part shade. (6-7) 60cm.
Tropaeolum brachyceras	£6.20	Chilean species, new to cultivation. Bright yellow, chubby flowers with yellow green spurs, pencilled crimson inside;- April to June. Fine, thread like stems. Scrambling to 75cm. Not sure it's for the garden but too new to assess.
Tropaeolum pentaphyllum	£6.20	Tall glabrous scrambler, trailer or climber with showy deep green deeply lobed foliage. Bonnet like scarlet flowers in late summer. May need winterf protection . Gritty retentive yet well drained soil in sun or part shade. H.to6m.
Tropaeolum polyphyllum	£6.50	Choice, rare & difficult. Trailing stems clothed in steely-blue leaves & yellow flowers in early summer. Dormant by late summer. Sharply drained, gritty soil in full sun. 15x90cm.
Tropaeolum sessilifolium	£6.20	Although only withstanding light frost, this spectacular species has twining stems with rather sparse, grey-green leaves. Large white flowers with the centre stained yellow & veined red;- late spring & early summer. Needs skill so please ask. 50cm.
Tropaeolum speciosum (AGM)	£8.00	Although this plant does better in the north, it is growable in the south given a cool moist root run in retentive soil. Delicate frail stems & small nasturtium-like scarlet red flowers; all summer into autumn followed by indigo berries. Ht.180cm.
Tropaeolum tricolor (AGM)	£5.50	Delicate, twining climber for the cold green house with five lobed leaves on fragile stems. A profusion of elfin like, spurred scarlet flowers with a purple rim around a yellow moth in late spring. Dormant by summer. Dry soil in sun. HT to 2mtrs.
Tulbaghia cernua CD&R 199	£4.60	More of a bulbous species with rather broad, strap like dark green leaves, dormant in winter. Arching stems with nodding green flowers with a yellow trumpet during mid to late summer. Will need the protection of a cold greenhouse in winter. (7-8) 50cm.
Tulbaghia 'Cosmic'	£4.80	Tall violacea hybrid with heads of dusky pink buds opening to slightly reflexed silver purple flowers with a copper stripe down each petal. Large golden trumpet. Flower colour deepens with age. Fleshy, strap like glaucous leaves. Strong grower for a warm, sheltered spot in sun. (5-9) 55cm.
Tulbaghia 'Fairy Star'	£4.80	cominsii x violacea. Small, delicate bulbous perennial with nodding umbels of soft pink flowers with a slightly deeper corolla from late spring through summer. Fine grassy, onion scented leaves. Hardy in very sheltered spots or protect in winter. 30cm.
Tulbaghia 'Hazel'	£5.50	Taller hybrid bred in Wales with onion scented, flat glaucous leaves. Heads of dusky brown-pink flowers with a copper-rust corolla, smelling of incense during the evening. late into flower for a Tulbaghia from June to the frosts. Very warm, sheltered spot in
Tulbaghia 'John May's Special'	£4.35	South African Allium relative, with umbels of large, starry lilac-pink flowers throughout summer. Narrow grey leaves with a strong onion smell. Hardy in a very sheltered spot in full sun in well drained soil. (5-9) 45cm.
Tulbaghia leucantha H&B 11996	£4.50	syn. dieterlinii. Tiny little species with small orange & brown flowers during summer. Narrow, wispy, grass-like leaves. Will not tolerate much frost & needs to be kept very dry in spring. Multiplies well. (6-8) 25cm.

Tulbaghia montana	£4.35	Much confused in cultivation with leucantha, this small, bulbous species has fine tufts of thread-like, fresh, evergreen leaves. Tiniest, trumpet-shaped white flowers with golden-yellow corolla;- spring & summer. Warm, sheltered spot in sun. (5-8) 10cm.
Tulbaghia simmleri	£4.35	Although only marginally hardy this is excellent in pots. Clumps of evergreen grassy leaves topped long lasting, MAUVE, sweetly scented flowers; August & September. Good for cutting. Gritty well drained soil in sun. 45x30cm.
Tulbaghia violacea 'Alba'	£4.60	More or less evergreen, bulbous perennial with evergreen, strongly onion scented, glossy leaves. Heads of starry pure white flowers with a sweet scent through summer to the frosts. Needs a light, free draining soil in a sunny, sheltered spot. (6-10) 40cm.
Tulbaghia violacea 'Pallida'	£4.50	Narrow basal grey green leaves. Erect stems carry umbels of small rich lilac blue bell shaped flowers. Sheltered sunny site in well drained soil. 60x20cm. Jul-Sept.
Typhonium roxburghii	£5.20	Small, surprisingly quick spreading species with short red stems topped by radial, velvet textured leaves divided into narrow leaflets. Small, stinky cream spathes spotted red during early summer. Seems reasonably hardy in a sheltered woodland garden. 30cm.
Uvularia sessilifolia	£4.50	Good spreading plant with a mass of erect stems with hanging, narrow, tubular, creamy bells. For cool, shady conditions in a peaty soil. 30x30cms. Flowers: April-May.
Uvularia sessilifolia 'Variegata'	£7.50	Very slow, if a little miffy spring woodlander. Creeping patches of elliptic green leaves, edged creamy-white. Small tufts of bell-shaped, soft straw yellow flowers from mid to late spring. Needs cossetting in a cool, moist woodland soil in part or full shade. (4-5)
